SUGAR-The Eastern markets remain Sugare—The Eastern markets remain exceedingly dull with prices favoring buyers, who display but little desire to purchase on the spot. The statistical position, however, is favorable, the 3 months to April showing 17,000 tons more meltings of foreign sugar.

Regarding situation, we quote from Willet & Pamlen's Circular as follows: As regards prices we are now in the

As regards prices we are now in the same position relative to the Cuba and B. W. I. crops that the U. K. was in, relative to the Beet crop, when prices of Beet fell to 9s. 10½d. As the fabricants were relieved by selling their carly undusting and become early productions and became more in-dependent of buyers, prices gradually rose to 12s. 6d. The necessities of Cuban planters now compel their selling at the lowest prices ever known; but this should be soon followed by more independence on their part, when prices should also follow the course of the Beet market again, as has been the case


