Arrived S. S. Mariposa, June 28, from the Colonies. Memorandum. Sailed from Sydney June 12, at 5:29 p. m.; arrived at Auckland, June 16, at midnight; sailed from Auckland, June 17, at 3:11 p. m.; arrived at Apia, Samoa, on June 21; sailed from Apia, at 6:03 on same day; took the pilot at Honolulu on June 28, at 3:10 p. m.

The Mariposa brought freight for the following Honolulu firms: H. Hackfeld & Co., E. Hoffschlaeger & Co., Chas. Girdler, Hobron, Neumann & Co., J. T. Waterhouse, York Street Flax Spinning Co., Hollister & Co, Mrs. Greenwell, McChesney & Sons, Henry May & Co., Chas. T. Gulick, P. G. Camarinos, C. Walte.

The steamer Miike Maru left yesterday morning at 11 o'clock for Yokohama with 457 Japanese laborers who are returning to their native land. The friends of the passengers were at the wharf waving their handkerchiefs to those on board.

The schooner Wm. H. Talbot will complete discharging her coal next Saturday. Messrs. W. G. Irwin & Co. will load her with sugar for San Francisco.

The Mariposa came up from Samoa in six days and twenty-one hours. It is considered very fast time.

Funeral Obsequies.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Hanakeola Leleo Kinimaka took place yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and was largely attended. Of the five societies she was a member of, four turned out, the Hui Aloha Aina, Liliuokalani Educational Societies, Riding Society, Hui Manawalea and Hawaiian Patriotic League. Mrs. Kinimaka leaves eight children living, five girls and three boys. Her remains were buried at the Kawaiahao cemetery beside those of her husband, who died nearly ten years ago.
