#### TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The latest letter to the Advertiser from the pen of "Kalakaua's barber" says in one paragraph that Presi dent McKinley only likes honest men. In another paragraph the writer says that McKinley likes S. B. Dole very much. There seems to be a pronounced inconsistency in the President's likings and dislikes.

The dreaded plague is appearing in all parts of the world under very different names. In Hongkong they call it Bubonic plague, and those who catch it die. In San Francisco it is the political plague, and the promoters of it grow fat. In Honolulu it is known as the financial plague, the symptoms of which are described by the new medical term Getintodamonssurplus.

A very prominent citizen interested in the lumber trade wrote r let ter to a Honolulu friend from San Francisco a few weeks ago, in which he expressed his hearty approval of the policy of the Board of Health in burning anything in sight wher ever a case of plague should be found or traced to. But when a case happened in a building on which he held a mortgage, his agent wrote a letter to the Board of Health protesting strongly against the burning of that particular house. Human nature is the same all over the world.

from a great medical society in Europe asking for an exhaustive report on the plague epidemic, as it appeared in Honolulu, the methods adopted by the civil authorities and in securing this first invoice of the the cost of checking the dread disease. Our report had been prepared, and the prophylactic injections referred to at some length, when we reased our writing after reading the "plague" bill in this morning's Advertiser. The medical scientists who wish to learn all about our plague will doubt our veracity when we state that among the methods used for stamping out the plague, according to official documents, are the purchase of cocktail-shakers from a firm of temperance people; the consumation of ice cream and cakes, and the lunching at a hotel of a member of the Board of Health with three invited guests. The world-famed men who expect our report will think that a very serious question is being treated frivolously and will be unable to understand that to suppress the plague the paraphernalias referred to are necessary-at least in Honolulu.

We think the moment has come that the quarantine should be raised in the islands. The plague can no longer be considered epidemic, and sporadic cases may crop up for years to come, and the closing of the inter-island trade under the circumstances, even for another week, seems absurd. No more money can be squeezed out of the treasury and consequently there can be no good 1317 H

reas in for finding a new case tomorrow. The plague has been bought off with a paltry few millious of dollars, and it should fill the contract by stopping its terrible ravages which, during the last three months, have caused a greater loss of life than ever occurred in a great American-Spanish battle, to wit, nearly 60 people and less than the number of victims who died of consumption during a similar period. The country has suffered a great loss through the so called plague, and the people is not prepared to stand a further loss caused by measures no longer necessary. Let the quarantine be lifted on Monday next, and, we feel assured, that neither Hilo, Labaina or the ports on Kausi will turn out sharpshooters, fire engines or resolutions upon the arrival of steamers from Honolula. In the proper sense of the word Honolulu is no longer an infected port.
